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How 2-times-a-year OCREVUS treatments are given

OCREVUS treatment is administered by infusion over a 90-minute period. Your doctor will administer an OCREVUS infusion over 90 minutes at a treatment site. It is given through an IV line into your vein. Each infusion is followed by a 30-minute observation period. After each infusion, you will be monitored for 30 minutes to make sure you are feeling okay and your vital signs are normal. You will be able to go home after the infusion is over. Your doctor will tell you when to come back for your next infusion. You will be given instructions on how to take your medicine and how to manage any side effects.

OCREVUS treatment is given every 6 months for 2 years

OCREVUS is a prescription medicine used to treat certain types of cancer. It is given by infusion over a 90-minute period. Your doctor will tell you how to use it and what to expect.

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Infection & Injection reactions

At times, children and young people (CYP) develop infection reactions associated with their condition, or as a result of treatment. It is important to watch for symptoms and to report any signs of infection to your healthcare provider (HCP) as soon as possible. Infection reactions can be life threatening but are usually treatable if identified.

At times, the immune system reacts to the drug, leading to infection.

How to report safety information to your HCP

Suggestions for support partners

Review your treatment

Indications and Important Safety Information (cont.)

Warnings

- **Use of this medicine increases the risk of infection.** Infection with *Candida* species may lead to getting other infections such as shingles, yeast infections, thrush infections, ear infections, tooth infections, skin infections, sinusitis, and urinary tract infections. Infection with *Aspergillus* species may lead to the development of lung disease. All patients taking this medicine should be alert to the signs of the following types of infection including fever, chills, or a respiratory infection such as a cold, cough, or flu. Report infection signs/symptoms to your healthcare provider and they will administer special tests to monitor for infections while taking this medicine. Also, patients may need to receive prophylactic antibiotics and may need to receive more information about fungal infections. A skin infection may occur that does not heal or a skin infection that you feel is getting worse. Inform your healthcare provider of any skin infection. Patients who receive this medicine should be alert to signs of infection.

- **Important safety information:** Before starting treatment with this medicine, your healthcare provider should ask you to have a complete blood count. If you have any conditions that may affect your blood count or if you are taking any medicine that may affect your blood count, including low blood count drugs, your healthcare provider will monitor your blood count regularly. If you experience any symptoms that may affect your blood count, including fatigue, weakness, or dizziness, inform your healthcare provider.
